REGINE SCHWARZER DELIBERATIONS ON FERMOY

When visiting The David Roche Foundation House Museum, Regine Schwarzer's attention was immediately drawn to the diverse, small-scale, precious, utilitarian artefacts held in cabinets throughout Fermoy House. These treasures prompted her to research their historical uses, and to contemplate what the objects meant to the people that lived with them many years ago.

Schwarzer has created small objects for daily use and appreciation: containers, canisters, tea caddy spoons, toothpick holders, spice dishes with spoons, bodkin cases, and other objet d'art. Often thought as commonplace or designed for their utility, these have been elevated beyond the everyday through the use of precious metals, gemstones, rocks and minerals. A selection of jewellery and works from the artist's archive are also displayed.

CANINE TIDBITS



It has often been said of David Roche that there were two constants in his life: his drive to create his collection of decorative and fine arts, and his dedication breeding and exhibiting pure bred dogs. These distinct passions came together in the important collection of animal art he developed throughout his life, notably some fabulous dog paintings.

The dog paintings were not confined to the house. Art was also displayed on the walls of the kennels, including watercolours, sketches and a very large oil painting of three Afghans by Donald H Green commissioned by David in 1972. Framed photographs celebrated David's dogs winning at major shows, and David judging at overseas appointments.

The last dogs to be imported into Australia by David were two Smooth Fox Terriers, a bitch from Belgium, Ch Belfox Bigoudi, and a male from Hungary. David wanted to commission a portrait Bigoudi, and with input from Martyn Cook he was able to secure the services of the hugely talented Jeremy Boot. The illustrated pastel sketch was last on the wall of Fermoy Kennels.

TODAY'S TREASURE

Showcasing the favourite pieces of our volunteers in The David Roche Collection. In this edition, Geoff S writes about a distinctive portrait displayed in the Military Dining Room at Fermoy House.

A striking portrait by German artist Heinrich Schmidt (1757–1828) hangs in the Military Dining Room at Fermoy House. Painted in 1817, the work depicts a young man dressed in the resplendent dolman and pelisse worn by Hussars. According to military historian Ronald Pawly, details of the uniform, shoulder strap, and crimson and silver belt sash designate the sitter as a Sub-Lieutenant of the *Guardia d'Interna Sicurezza* (internal security guard) of the Kingdom of the Two Sicilies.

The *Guardia* was formed in 1813 to uphold order in the city of Naples, and its members were recruited exclusively from the commercial circles, liberal professions, small landowners and dignitaries of Naples. It is likely, therefore, that the sitter - whose identity awaits rediscovery - was a Neapolitan. The Kingdom of the Two Sicilies emerged out of the 1815 Treaty of Castalanza, which ended the Neapolitan War. The treaty restored Ferdinand I de Bourbon as ruler, who retained the Guardia as evidenced by the FB monogram on the shoulder strap's silver shield.

Schmidt was born in Otweiler, Saarland and trained as a painter in Saarbrücken and Mannheim. He moved to Rome in 1787 where he met Johann Wolfgang von Goethe, who called him "il Fornaro" – the baker. In 1792 Schmidt married his model, Theresa Banducci.

As French troops advanced towards Rome during the Revolutionary Wars, Schmidt moved to Naples in late 1797. He later received numerous commissions from Napoleon's brother-in-law and King of Naples (1808–1815), Joachim Murat, including a portrait of him now at the Palace of Caserta. At the end of the 18th century, Naples was the largest city in Italy and the third largest in Europe, attracting the best artists, composers, and musicians.


