Our next exhibition *Quilts: The Fabric of War 1760-1900* opens 15 February. This display of quilts made from military fabrics comes to us from the collection of Annette Gero. The incredible workmanship of soldiers and tailors from times past makes this a must-see exhibition for quilters, textile lovers, and anyone interested in military history.

The beautifully crafted exhibitions you'll experience throughout 2024 include *The Luke Jones Collection* of *Australian Toys*, an enthralling selection of children's toys dating from the 1880s through to the 1960s. The Annette Gero Collection

Historical quilts with striking geometric patterns, exotic animals, biblical stories, and even the Venetian state galley are but a few of the extraordinary images you will see displayed in this exhibition from the renowned quilt collection of Annette Gero. Using brightly coloured military fabrics from eighteenth and nineteenth century uniforms these rare patchwork quilts were made by men. Some during military service and others sewn after the tailors or soldiers returned home. Through their fabrics, these quilts reveal military service in the Prussian, Napoleonic, and Crimean wars, and British India.

This exhibition reveals new and unseen treasures acquired in Australia and abroad from the private collection of Annette Gero. An Adelaide-exclusive exhibition not to be missed.

CANINE TIDBITS



Image: Ausscot Beau Geste, known as Bee Gee, 1970s. Seeking a companion dog that could also watch Fermoy House, David Roche imported the German Shepherd from the United Kingdom in 1974.

David Roche's collection of fine and decorative arts contains an abundance of canine imagery. In Fermoy House many breeds of dog may be seen within paintings and sculpture, on ceramics and cushions, and even on a wallpaper. Fermoy House was also very much home for some dogs, including German Shepherd Bee Gee.

Remembering an intruder's attempt to enter Fermoy House, David desired a house dog that was alert and observant. Consulting with his great friend Thelma Gray, David Roche imported Ausscot Beau Geste, a German Shepherd Dog from the United Kingdom in 1974. Bee Gee, as he was known, had an exceptional character, and was remembered for his superb temperament. Testament to his protective instinct, each evening Bee Gee played piquet by sleeping across the main bedroom door.

FROM THE ARCHIVES

During a recent sorting of archival material, a red leather-look photograph album was an unassuming housing for a small group of newspaper clippings that date to the earliest days of David Roche's career as a breeder and judge of the all-breeds standard.

Clippings from the *Waterbury Sunday Republican* (USA) in August 1952 record Roche's attendance at Great Barrington Kennel Club's 10th Annual Show, and report his judging of the Northwestern Connecticut Dog Club's match. The letter of invitation to judge at this event, and an announcement for the event are also held.

Most importantly in this group are clippings from *Dog World* (UK) that report on David Roche's judging and record his comments for the British Breed Dog Society's all British Breeds Show at Ascot Wood, Berkshire. This major event saw near-record level entries, resulting in David drawing an entry of 137, with 56 exhibitors. He was reported favourably for his diligence when carrying out his judging responsibilities.

Smaller clippings give a deeper insight into his work. One notes his appointment to Vice-President of the Kerry Blue Terrier Club of England, and another reports on his purchase of Berenwode Outrider, a Kerry Blue Terrier.






