THE EXCITEMENT OF COLLECTING

A lecture by Annette Gero Thursday 18 April 6:00pm–7:15pm

One finds a quilt. It has no story. One looks at the fabric. One looks at how it was made. One looks at the imagery.

Quilts tell us extraordinary stories. Through them we might bear witness the marriage of King George III; America's emancipation in the War of Independence; a family's immigration from Prussia to Australia; or even the first giraffes seen in Europe. Some were created by Australian soldiers returning from war; some imitate renowned 18th-century artwork. One quilt's story even revolves around a scandalous theft from a Russian Princess, betrothed to Queen Victoria's third son! The fascinating stories woven into quilts provides glimpses into the times and places that they represent.

In this talk, Dr Annette Gero shares insights into the stories behind the fabulous textiles which she has discovered and documented over the last two decades. Sweeping across continents and centuries, this talk will also cast light upon a convict quilt which hold particular relevance to Australia.

ADELAIDE SCHOOL OF DESIGN PORTIÈRE

A lecture by Jo Vandepeer Thursday 9 May 6:00pm–7:15pm

The Royal Collection's *Portière* 1901 is the keeper of a forgotten South Australian story. To commemorate Federation, this unique work was commissioned, executed and presented by women to the future Queen Mary. Yet for a period of time, it was nowhere to be found.

In this lecture, Dr Jo Vandepeer sets the scene and pulls back the curtain to reveal how from either ends of the globe, *Portière* 1901 has been rediscovered.

About the Speaker

Dr Jo Vandepeer is a South Australian historian whose research focuses on the decorative arts, colonial artists and the Adelaide School of Design. She is currently a Visiting Research Fellow at the University of Adelaide and recently received the Art History and Curatorship Alumni Network grant to investigate the Portière in the Royal Collection Trust.

CANINE TIDBITS

NEW ACQUISITION

The Foundation has supplemented its Napoleonic collections with the purchase of a satirical jug produced at the Cambrian Pottery, Wales, at about the time of Napoleon's 1814 defeat and abdication.

The Dutch shape jug is transfer-printed with a satirical cartoon engraved by James Brindley. Central in the scene is Napoleon, shackled, being pulled towards a hole by a horned devil. Napoleon laments 'Oh, Cursed Ambition What hast thou brought me to now.' Surrounding this, a soldier taunts the disgraced Emperor, a former ally retracts his salutation, two onlookers discuss Napoleon's exile to Elba, and minstrels sing a song. The jug's rim is inscribed 'April 1st 1814', and deliberately connects Napoleon's fall to April Fools' Day. Titled *Bonaparte Dethron'd*, the jug was one of two James Brindley designs that the Cambrian Pottery put into production. The other, titled *Peace and Plenty*, commented on the May 1814 Treaty of Paris.

The jug is in very fine condition, and was previously in the collection of British glass expert and antique dealer Martin Mortimer MBE (1928-2022). It complements and further enriches The David Roche Foundation's strong Napoleonic holdings, which include a Durs Egg pistol presented to Napoleon by Colonel Thomas Thornton; a bronze portrait of Napoleon modelled by Jean-Bertrand Andrieu; portraits of Napoleon's first fiancée, Desirée Clary and a mistress Catherine Joséphine Duchesnois; and many other items of interest

TODAY'S TREASURE

Showcasing the favourite pieces of our volunteers in The David Roche Collection. In this edition, Leslie S draws our eye to a pair of handsome bronze reliefs.

An impressive pair of bronze reliefs depicting a cavalry procession hang in the museum foyer. The reliefs have always caught my attention because of their tense excitement seen in the agitation of the soldiers and the powerful rearing movements of the horses.

The reliefs represent sections of a much larger work executed by the Danish sculptor Bertel Thorvaldsen (1770–1844). A rival of the Italian sculptor Antonio Canova (1757–1822), Thorvaldsen was commissioned by Napoleon in 1811 to create a frieze for the Hall of Honour in the Palazzo del Quirinale in Rome. Napoleon had the intention of using the palace as his Italian domicile.

The original frieze measures 35 metres long and 1 metre in height. It represents Alexander the Great's triumphal entry into Babylon after he defeated the Persian Army in 331. The frieze depicts Alexander riding in a chariot followed by a procession of Macedonian infantry and cavalry. They march towards representatives of the vanquished Persians, who welcome and pay homage to the victors. Thorvaldsen likely took inspiration from similar iconography on friezes made for the Parthenon Temple, Athens.

Thorvaldsen also commissioned a publication depicting engravings of the frieze. Several friezes were subsequently commissioned for other patrons, including one in marble, and an expanded frieze which was made for the Christiansborg palace in Copenhagen.

The David Roche Collection reliefs are directly taken from two small sections of this frieze, and were cast in Australia using plaster moulds that Mr. Roche purchased in Britain.



THE CEDARS In Service - Nora Heysen: War Artist Until 25 August 2024

Nora Heysen was appointed Australia's first female official war artist 80 years ago. From 1944 to 1946 she produced over 170 works of art for the Australian War Museum in Canberra. This new exhibition, displayed in Nora Heysen's studio, features some precious studies that Nora retained in her private collection.

Following enlistment in 1943, Nora's initial task as war artist was to paint portraits of the commanding officers of the Women's Auxiliary Services. She later travelled to New Guinea and several Australian locations where she captured the diverse roles of women and men who served in medical teams and support services at home and in the Pacific region. In this adventurous period of her life, Nora Heysen met significant challenges.


