## AUSTRALIAN TOYS 1880–1965 THE LUKE JONES COLLECTION

#### 1 June – 24 August 2024

In simpler times before smart phones and video games, we played with tin toys, wooden trucks, and paper planes.

Rediscover the excitement and wonder of childhood through this exhibition of historic Australian toys from the collection of Luke Jones. Initiated by a 9-year-old North Adelaide paperboy's earnings, Jones has nurtured and researched his extensive collection for over 40 years. From board games to a toy hills hoist, this exhibition provides a detailed insight into Australian childhood through the lens of play. You will see a fascinating range of Australian toys made between the 1880s and the 1960s, including refined lithographed tinplate toys of the 1920s, charming folk art creations, mass-produced toys that emerged during the post-war period, and European and Japanese made toys with local relevance. Be engaged by toys which are inspired by historic events, be entertained by toys which celebrate Australia's love of sport, and be enchanted by fantasy creations straight from toymakers' imaginations.

# **CANINE TIDBITS**



Born in 1973, Ch. Fermoy Holy Joe was the son of two Afghans which David Roche had imported from the United States, Coastwind Holy Man and Crown Crest Miss Capriole. Holy Joe had a magnificent coat with a lot of blue and silver. He was father to several Australian champions, including Ch. Fermoy Desiree.

The Australian Kennel Club's breed standards designates that 'The Afghan Hound should be dignified and aloof with a certain keen fierceness', 'The head must be held proudly', and that 'The whole appearance of the dog should give the impression of strength and dignity combining speed and power.' Beautifully groomed in this photograph taken by Michael Trafford just around the corner from Fermoy House in Botanic Park, Holy Joe handsomely exhibits these characteristics.

## **FROM THE ARCHIVES**

The David Roche Collection is fortunate to hold many works with impressive provenance. Whether it be opera singer Maria Callas, fashion designer Gianni Versace, or Princess Margaret, the history of ownership enriches our understanding not only of the objects, but also the interests and personal taste of the people who owned them.

Wilfred Evill (1890–1963) was a London-based solicitor who formed an impressive collection of antiques and one of the finest collections of contemporary British art of his time. Like David Roche, Evill selected the best examples of work that he could find; and would upgrade his collection as better examples came on to the market. He was also an intensely private collector, and just a small number of close friends knew of the beautiful collection that was housed in his residence at Welbeck Street, Marylebone. Upon his death in 1963 he bequeathed his collection to Honor Frost, a pioneering marine archaeologist whom Evill had taken in after she had been orphaned as a child. When she died in 2010, the extraordinary collection was dispersed by Sotheby's, with proceeds benefitting the Honor Frost Foundation, to promote the advancement and research of maritime archaeology with particular focus on the eastern Mediterranean.

David Roche acquired four pieces from the Evill/Frost sale: a 'klismos' style armchair in the manner of Thomas Hope, a Sèvres sugar bowl (pot à sucre Calabre) painted by André-Vincent Vielliard; a rare Sèvres Revolutionary period teapot and cover (Théière litron) painted by Charles-Nicolas Dodin; and the exquisite Sèvres tea service (déjeuner Hébert) decorated by Jean-Jacques Pierre le Jeune with painted fruit and flowers (pictured). A rarely seen detail and valuable marker of provenance on the porcelain items is Evill's collector's stamp, marked WAE for Wilfred Ariel Evill.

## **TODAY'S TREASURE**

Showcasing the favourite pieces of our volunteers in The David Roche Collection. In this edition, Geoff S examines a handsome and complicated table clock by Daniel Quare

Daniel Quare (Britain 1648–1724) was one of the most illustrious clockmakers of England's golden age of horology, and a worthy contemporary of Thomas Tompion, George Graham and Daniel Delander. In 1671 he became a Brother of the Clockmakers' Company, Junior Warden in 1705, and Master in 1708.

He was a very active member of the London Quaker community during the last quarter of the 17th century, attending the Meeting House, refusing to support parish priests, pay tithes or contribute to militia levies. He was heavily fined but not imprisoned. He organised assistance for Quaker prisoners in Britain, including caring for their families and businesses.

He had unusual access to people in power using that to petition on behalf of Quakers in England and abroad. On business trips abroad he delivered Quaker tracts on the continent. George I offered Quare the post of King's Watchmaker for £300 per year. However, being a Quaker by religion he was unable to swear the necessary Oath of Allegiance. Even so, the King allowed him free access to the palace at any time.

This is a "repeating" or *grande sonnerie* clock. This very advanced mechanism strikes a bell every quarter hour, followed by a gong indicating the current hour. Quare was granted a patent in 1687 by James II for this repeating arrangement.

The case is an exceptional quality Boulle work Religieuse case made with tortoiseshell, brass and pewter inlays. Jeremy Evans, former Curator of Horology at the British Museum, believes the case to most likely to have been made in London by a Huguenot case-maker.






