Did you know that each year DRG is actively conserving its collection for future generations to enjoy? This year Kristin at Artlab Australia has been working on a rare and fragile textile acquired by David Roche from the Dalva Brothers in New York, in 2007. Due to the condition of this Louis XVI period embroidered waistcoat (1780-1789) it needed extensive stabilising treatment and a new mount for display. Kristin has been busy reducing staining, adding another support lining and silk grounds to larger areas of loss, as well as making copies of missing buttons.


Why save this particular waistcoat?

The embroidered palm trees and monkeys are recorded in a preparatory design drawing for the pockets known as 'Les Macaques' found in a pattern book at the Musée des Tissus et des Arts décoratifs, in Lyon, France. Just one other waistcoat of this finished design is known; and it resides in Victoria and Albert Museum, London. This makes it pretty special!

The conservation treatment costs \$8000, plus the creation of a new bespoke frame for display in Fermoy House. We seek your help in raising money toward its conservation and all donations over \$500 can be acknowledged on the credit line as well having the opportunity to view the work with Kristin, the textile conservator.

The Album of Northern Dogs



A RARE ALBUM OF DOGS FOUND

Recently discovered within David Roche's canine archive was a rare booklet and album of images celebrating Laika, breeds of spitz that are indigenous to the northern region of Eurasia.

The Album of Northern Dogs was published in 1896 by Prince Andrey Shirinsky-Shikhmatov, a Russian statesman, politician and diplomat. His keen interest in the dogs of northern Eurasia stemmed from his love of hunting, and saw him handle and judge dog breeds in the late 19th and early 20th centuries. A pamphlet written by Shirinsky-Shikhmatov accompanying the album outlines the earliest published observations for several varieties of Laika and related northern dogs.

The album is comprised of a table of measurements, a preface written by hunting expert Leonid Pavlovich Sabaneyev, and reprints of 31 photographs of Laikas surrounded by illustrations by artist Aleksei Stepanovich Stepanov. It was dedicated to Grand Duke Nicholas Nikolaevich of Russia, a grandson of Tsar Nicholas I, and the proceeds from sales of the album were directed towards the establishment of a colony for people living with Leprosy in Yakutsk, a cause that had been championed by Mercy Sister Kate Marsden.

This most interesting album records several uncommon and threatened native dog varieties, and evidences David Roche's unfaltering interest in dogs and their enduring relationship with people. Rarely seen, the album is not recorded in Australian public libraries on Trove or WorldCat, further underscoring the significance of David Roche's collection of publications and periodicals relating to dogs.

TODAY'S TREASURE

Sleep of Endymion

Anne-Louis Girodet

This painting acquired by David Roche for his neoclassical bedroom in 1999, is based on a theme from mythology. It is a small version of a much larger painting of the same composition at the Louvre which was originally acquired by King Louis XVIII of France in 1818.

Painted by Anne-Louis Girodet de Roucy-Trioson (he liked adding extra names) it was met with adoration from the public and other artists, and regarded as 'sexy'. Girodet was a pupil of the famous artist Jacques-Louis David, and his work exemplified the first phase of Romanticism in French visual art.

The subject of our painting, Endymion, appears in both Greek and Roman mythology. In the Greek version Selene, a chaste virgin goddess of the mood, falls in love with the mortal Endymion, a youth of grace and beauty, who was said to be a shepherd. She wished to be with him forever, so she asked Zeus, the king of the gods on Mount Olympus, to grant Endymion eternal sleep so that she could visit him every night as he lay asleep on Mount Latmus in Caria. She bore him 50 daughters, who represent the fifty lunar months of the Olympiad.

Another version of the myth reads that Zeus offered the handsome shepherd a wish, and he chose to sleep and remain youthful forever. However, eternal sleep was not a gift all and was rather a punishment because Endymion had attempted to sleep with Zeus's wife.

In Girodet's painting, Endymion sleeps bathed in the light of the full moon with his faithful dog by his side. The scene is framed by the heavy, dark trees of the forest, to signify the vividness of the vision.


The poet John Keats, who was known for his mythological subjects in 1818 composed Endymion. It begins *A thing of beauty is a joy forever...*These words aptly describe Fermoy House.

FROM THE ARCHIVES

David Roche and Dance



David Roche was known to enjoy dancing, particularly the Scottish reel, and tripped the light fantastic at society events in Adelaide and abroad. Though he culled his large vinyl collection, the 200+ records that remain give insight into David's taste in music and include a wide selection of dance favourites ranging from the Philadelphia Orchestra's recording of Tchaikovsky's *Swan Lake* to three LPs by Lester Lanin and his Orchestra: *Dance to the Music of Lester Lanin*; *Dancing at the Mardi Gras*; and *Lester Lanin at the Tiffany Ball*.

Lester Lanin was born in Pennsylvania in 1907, and by the age of twenty had formed an ensemble that provided entertainment for the parties of socialites in Philadelphia and New York. His big break came when his ensemble performed at the debutante ball of heiress Barbara Hutton, which earned him great fame across the United States.

Lanin's orchestra was sought after for high profile events, including bills for Presidential inauguration balls, Grace Kelly's engagement party, and the wedding reception of Prince Charles and Lady Diana Spencer. The orchestra was best known for the 'businessman's bounce' jazz tempo, and during the height of its popularity, as many as twelve different ensembles toured the United States to perform at weddings, exclusive events, and even the prom nights of elite schools. Though Lanin died in 2007, the orchestra still performs to this day.

David Roche's records by Lanin's orchestra include covers of timeless tunes including *I* could have danced all night from Lerner and Loewe's My Fair Lady, the waltz from Tchaikovsky's *Eugene Onegin*, and *Oklahoma* from Rodgers & Hammerstein's musical of the same name.
