Pippa's humanitarian documentary work evolved from several years traveling with NGO One Voice to remote villages in India and Nicaragua, and a Syrian Refugee camp in Greece, documenting human experience and connection through co-creation.

About the Speakers

Dr Emma Kindred is a curator, art historian and writer. She is Curator at the National Portrait Gallery and Honorary Research Associate at the National Gallery of Australia. She is also an Honorary Research Fellow in Art History at University of Sydney, and has previously held curatorial positions at the National Gallery of Australia and Australian War Memorial. Major curatorial projects include Joan Ross: Those trees came back to me in my dreams (NPG 2024-25) and Belonging: stories of Australian art (NGA 2019-20).

Jacob Nash is a First Nations
Australian artist and designer whose ancestral land on his mother's side is in the Daly River. Growing up on Quandamooka Country, Jacob has spent the last two decades living and working across the Eora Nation (Sydney). His multidisciplinary practice spans Theatre, Film, TV, Fine Art, and Public Art, combining these diverse experiences to create iconic imagery and storytelling that reflect the stories, people, and Country from a distinct First Nations perspective.

Performing Poodles

Theo Townshend




Though you won't see any dancing dogs in the *Dancer* exhibition, a charming collage in the David Roche Collection depicts three prancing poodles!

The Performing Poodles montage was created by Theodosia (Theo) Townshend, an Irish-born artist who is best known for her mixed-media collages. Born on 17 July 1893 in Kilmallock, Townshend studied at the Dublin Metropolitan School of Art before moving to London for further instruction at the Slade School. There she met Neville Lewis, a South African student who had previously studied under Stanhope Forbes at Newlyn, and whose father would later become the Lord Mayor of Cape Town.

In 1915, Townshend and Lewis displayed at the New English Art Club's 54th Exhibition of Modern Pictures, and were married the following year in Devonport, Devon. However, their marriage wasn't to last and by 1922 they separated. Townshend's artistic legacy rests in her modestly proportioned collages, several of which feature hand-painted cuttings of dogs. Performing Poodles is a particularly exuberant example, with one poodle performing a hand (paw) stand; another playing the drum with its feet as it blows a horn, and a third beating a tambourine. In the background, a trick dog jumps through a hoop for an acrobat astride a galloping horse.

This charming canine montage was gifted by David Roche to long-serving kennel hand June Ashton, who presented it to the David Roche Collection in 2021.

TODAY'S TREASURE



Sleeping piglet

Exon Wemyss Ware (Britain 1988-2016) Brian Adams (1945– 2016)

Showcasing the favourite pieces of our volunteers in the David Roche Collection

Have you ever noticed the sleeping piglet on the bottom shelf of the Staffordshire ware collection display in the Den of Fermoy House? The intruder is decorated with a central large freeform deep pink cabbage rose, a second paler version towards the tail, and a bud stem on the back of the head. The piglet was made by Brian Adams and is a revised version of the 'Wemyss Ware' sleeping pig figurines first made at the Fife Pottery operated by Robert Heron & Sons.

The 'original' Wemyss Ware began production around 1882 when Bohemian decorator Karel Nekola arrived at Heron's Fife Pottery. Pieces, shaped as pigs or cats, sometimes sporting hats or fast asleep, were hand-decorated with colourful plant motifs, including cabbage roses. To gain full employment at Wemyss, any aspiring decorator had to demonstrate the ability to master the signature rose in full bloom. The Fife pottery closed in 1930 during the depression, and the rights to Wemyss Ware were bought by the Bovey Pottery in Devon. Karel Nekola's son, Joseph, also a decorator, joined the production team in Devon, which operated until 1957. These quirky early wares charmed and were coveted, with the Queen Mother an avid collector.

Born in Reading, England, in 1945, Brian Adams moved into pottery and ceramic restoration in the 1980s. He was particularly skilled in traditional production and firing methods as well as matching underglaze decoration. In 1987, Brian worked alongside Esther Weeks, a former Wemyss Ware decorator trained by Joseph Nekola, to create a group of nineteen 'new' Wemyss works for exhibition, and in 1988 began producing 'Exon Wemyss Ware' at the Exon Art Pottery, which he had founded in Ashdown, Devon. Around 2,700 pieces of Exon Wemyss were produced between 1988 and 2005.

FROM THE ARCHIVES



Boxes and bonbonieres

As the chill of winter settles over Adelaide, we're reminded of David Roche's long-standing tradition of travelling to the United Kingdom and Europe during May, June or July. This time of year was terrific for antique fossicking, when the major Grosvenor House and Olympia art and antique fairs were held in London. As Martyn Cook remembered: A London hotel room would be booked as a base during May and June to attend the Chelsea Flower Show, Ascot races, and the antiques fairs at Grosvenor House, Olympia, and Chelsea, and the auction houses - Christie's, Sotheby's and Bonhams, just to name a few.

During one such trip in 2005, David acquired a variety of charming small boxes and bonbonieres, including: a 19th century gold box mounted with a micro-mosaic depicting the Colosseum, a porcelain box by Spode in the shape of a butterfly, a patch box made from Blue John, and a Bilston enamel box in the shape of a hare.

Most interesting, however, is a box fashioned from string and cord which David purchased while visiting Sheffield. Decorated with a hand-tinted engraving depicting an unusual scene of a shepherd tailing a lamb, this one-of-a-kind object can now be seen in the Kitchen of Fermoy House.
