
From colonial works through to contemporary installations, this lecture will explore how dogs have been artists' greatest friends and inspirations.



A tribute to June Ashton

David Roche Gallery and South Australia's canine community were deeply saddened by the recent death of June Ashton, an international All Breeds Judge, long-term employee of Fermoy Kennels, volunteer guide at David Roche Gallery, and a lover of dogs and cats.

For nearly 35 years, June Ashton worked in the small team at David Roche's Fermoy Kennels, caring for Afghan Hounds, Kerry Blue Terriers, Smooth Fox Terriers and other breeds, such as German Shepherd, Greyhound and Chihuahua. June loved the dogs as her own and had a particular affinity with Afghan Hounds. In the kennel's later years, she had a deep admiration for Smooth Fox Terriers and loved walking them.

June's husband Malcolm, was an accomplished dog handler and successfully exhibited German Shepherd dogs and an English Springer Spaniel, Cruella de Vil. While June was not a showring handler, she was a committed, competent, and honest All Breeds Judge, who was engaged Australia-wide and in the United States.

Following the death of David Roche in 2013, June was among the foundational cohort of volunteer guides at David Roche Gallery until 2024. She unfailingly led visitors through David's home, Fermoy House, on Tuesday afternoons, and relished the ability to share her knowledge of Fermoy Kennels and her memories of Mr Roche while introducing visitors to his extraordinary art collection. June will be missed by all who knew her and valued her kindness, knowledge, and integrity.


